April Meeting

The April meeting of the Darby American Girl Book and Doll Club was held Friday, April 4, after school at the Darby Community Library.

The theme of our meeting was the Lewis and Clark Expedition, also known as the Corps of Discovery. The expedition started in St. Louis, MO in 1804. In November of that year, they had made it as far as North Dakota where they spent the winter.

Lewis and Clark hired Toussaint Charbonneau, husband of Sacajawea. Sacajawea was a Shoshone Indian, born near Salmon, ID and kidnapped when she was only 11 years old. Her captors sold her as a slave and she eventually met and married Mr.

Charbonneau. Lewis and Clark requested Sacajawea to join the expedition as a guide and translator.

Before the expedition set out for the West in the spring, Sacajawea gave birth to her son, Jean Baptiste, who was affectionately known as Pompi.

In August 1805, the Corps of Discovery arrived near Salmon, ID and Sacajawea was reunited with family members from her tribe. The expedition continued into the Bitterroot Valley, right down what is Main Street in present day Darby, MT.

In September, 1805, the explorers camped at Traveler's Rest near present day Lolo. Cold, hungry and very tired, they found the Nez Perce tribe (Kaya's people) and spent the winter near them.



Two of our club members shared stories of the Lewis and Clark expedition that they had learned reading books and in school. We all learned a lot about Lewis and Clark and Sacajawea.

We dressed our dolls as pioneers, explorers and Native Americans.

We had a tie vote for best dressed. Both Kiera and Anise earned an extra point towards the stylist chair to be awarded at the May meeting. Way to go girls!

Kaya was our very special guest and the American Girl Doll of the Month. Kaya met Sacajawea and the Corps of Discovery at her teepee and welcomed all with a warm fire. Walter, the wolf, joined in the fun and pretended to be Kaya's dog pulling a travois.



Peter was dressed as Merriweather Lewis with a rifle, back pack and compass. Thank you Albert for the loan of your compass! Paul played the part of William Clark with his satchel, journal, pen and binoculars. (They didn't really have binoculars back then but Miss Kay couldn't figure out how to make a telescope).

The book of the month was *Sacajawea: the story of Bird Woman and the Lewis and Clark Expedition* by Joseph Bruchac. This book is historical fiction and is written from both Sacajawea and Clark's points of view. Each chapter begins with a Shoshone legend or an excerpt from Clark's journals. This book is available to check out from the Darby library.
